Resorts — Carol Spohler

A week earlier and meeting-goers would have borne the brunt of the 6"-8" of rain that flooded many areas. A week following, though, was a pleasant week, and meeting night was your typical Columbus Day. In attendance were Phyllis Beechert, Bob and Marie Shaw, Dot Blenis, Allyn and Mary Shaw, Dave Dorpfeld (Greene County Historian), David and Judy Rundell, Orrin and Shirley Stevens, Stephanie Ingalls, Ron Golden, Janice Webb, Walter Ingalls, Carol Spohler (guest of the evening), and Don Teator.

The subject of the evening was Greenville Resorts, and Don started by showing a circa-1960 Greenville Chamber of Commerce brochure, and then reading the list of resorts in the Accomodations section. Keep in mind that boarding houses that had closed before this date were not included. A reduced-in-size copy is included, as is a facsimile of the accompanying map. We looked over the list, identified the ones we knew (which was most of them, which of course should be the case, being only fifty years ago, but, still it was not as easy as one might think). There were a few names that needed some jogging of memories but I think we figured most (except for #18 and #32A).

And then we turned to the guest of the evening – Carol Spohler, former owner of

Spohler's Elm Grove on Red Mill Rd, who served as a microcosm of the resort business for this evening. (I worked at Elm Grove from 1970 until its closing in 1983.) Carol highlighted the resort experience, especially from an owner's point-of-view, and gave a slew of details that marked the essence of the facets of keeping this kind of business alive.

Following will be a list of details given during Carol's account, in no particular order:

- the original resort was run by Anton and Mary Fursatz, opened in 1921; called Fursatz Elm Grove
- original Spohler resort in Acra, 'merged' with Fursatz, and was renamed iSpohler's Elm Grove
- Anton's daughter Anne, married Fred Spohler, took over from her parents in 1955, Fred died 1967, and was helped by Fred (son) & Carol
- Fred (son) left IBM to take over resort in 1973, operated it with Carol until 1983 when it was sold
- Carol started working in the main office in 1957
- · both Fursatzes died in 1969
- original farm had 110 acres more details
- spring cleaning
- in 'old' days, chambermaids worked seven days a week, as did waitresses
- preparing the swimming pool was quite an undesirable job

- Fred & Carol added rooms in Winter House for residence, kept own house in South Cairo at same time
- Anne Spohler married Clarence Beare, who helped with resort chores
- Carol took on cooking responsibility
- entertainment music, bingo, horse racing, weenie roasts
- · cooking of hamburgers late at night
- · Carol at resort for 40 years
- Fred ran four H&R Block offices, one in Greenville (Bryant's first, then Baumann's)
- · boiler inspections cost money
- music companies wanted royalties from music played
- · Board of Health inspections
- · insurance for every sport played
- · keeping up with wants of guests
- · three meals vs two meal days
- a set menu for each day of week (...if it is Wednesday lunch, then...)

Thank you, Carol, for sharing your experiences and for reminding us of a 'world' that many knew not so long ago.

Then, I went around the room to see who had any experience with working at resorts.

- · Christine had worked at Sunny Hill
- David Rundell was a dishwasher at Ingleside for a year
- Stephanie had an inside look at Ingleside
- · Janice has worked on the mountaintop
- Dot Blenis was, for this eveing, the "Queen Worker" at resorts, recounting for ten minutes the different places she had been at: Boyd's, Lennon House (Purling), Weldon House, Shepard, 12 Maples, Colonial Manor, Balsam Shade, Sunny Hill, Pine Lake, Ingalside (her longest stint)

Marie Shaw had brought a couple dozen post cards of resorts in the area, and we viewed them after the meeting broke up. Thanks, Marie, for sharing.

Don had separate folders for each resort (actually, Edna Adams prepared them) and we took time during the meeting to browse

Also available this evening, but no time was allotted for reading, was the July 20 & 23, 1983, Daily Mail articles written by Edna Adams called, "Greenville Resorts in Review." These gave an overview of the current situation and some of the resorts, along with a brief history. This article begs to be reproduced some time.

Deb had made thin but chewy brownies for the evening.

One of the pamphlets in the Historian's collection is "Greenville in the Catskill Mountains: Where Nature Reigns Supreme: comprising the hamlets of Freehold, Norton Hill, Gayhead, Surprise, South Westerlo," a Greenville Chamber of Commerce publication. It is chocked full of advertising, page after page of boarding houses and farms ads. Based on clues inside, I think the book is 1937 or 1938 (one place mentions it has been two years since the Rip Van Winkle Bridge, which 1935). The advertising of Gentile management is a bit eye-opening. Some of the establishment are quite familiar, such as:

- Ingalside Farm, Warren T Ingalls
- · Balsam Shade, B. E. Griffin
- Elm Grove House, Anton Fursatz, Greenville
- The Shepard Farm, (no name), Greenville Others are not known or I'd like to confirm (in order of appearance in the pamphlet): (look on back page)

During our meeting, I mentioned the idea of a few projects to start, or continue, working on. One of them would to accumulate and organize information about a topic and then help figure out how to store the information and make it available. The three I had in mind were: 1) Resorts, 2) Churches, and 3) One Room School Houses.

We noted that Mary Kruppenbacher was in the hospital (at the time of the meeting), hoping to be home soon. We wish Mary a speedy and full recovery.

And, most of you have heard or read of Harriett's passing. No matter how expected, these events still sting and shock. I won't attempt to recall Harriett's contributions in this newsletter. (see next paragraph)

Thank you, Carol, and the rest who pitched, for another entertaining, and worthwhile, meeting.


