Walter Ingalls' 1947 Trip

Another warm and humid evening greeted our early August meeting: Bob & Marie Shaw, Christine Mickelsen, Stephanie Ingalls, Richard Ferriolo, Walter & Donna Ingalls, David & Judy Rundell, Tim & Judy Adams (Walter's nephew & wife), Dot Blenis, Dot Hesel, Kay Sutton (Walter's daughter, of course!) and son Walter, and Don Teator were in attendance.

Don started the meeting showing a book and a notebook. The book was Kenneth S. Joy's hard cover, self-published account of his life, a memoir in his own words left to his family, and to anyone else reading it.

My interest in the book (Born on the Hill) was the connections to Greenville. Ken's mother Lillian lived on the west end of Old Plank Road (where the family moved to after living on Sayre Rd in Medusa, thus the name of the book), and operated the residence as Meadowdale, a typical boarding house in the Town of Greenville in the early-mid century. Another connection is Ken's memories of the community and GCS, he being one of the earliest graduates from the centralized school. (He had siblings Dorothy and Walter.)

The notebook was a collection of family material from Ken's sister Dorothy, with a collection of vignettes of family and farm life.

I was first contacted by Ed Joy (the next generation; GCS class of '61?) who wondered if I was interested in Ken's book, and it went on from there. This is also my chance to remind all of you to write your life story and memories before people like me, or people you don't know, attempt to do so.

The program this evening was a Walter Ingalls' story. On one hand, it is only a six week cross-

country trip, something lots of people do sometime in their life. On the other hand, and the reason for the evening's focus, it was such a classic trip for a sixteen year old, connecting family and local history, that it was worthy of airing for the Local History Group.

Half of the fun of Walter's story is the background. He was sixteen in early July 1947, working to buy a car (the horse story is a bit heart-breaking), not really thinking about a summer trip. His father was busy; his mother suffered heart trouble the year before. It was this health issue that resulted in the trip – Eleanor was promised a trip on which she could see the sights she had wanted to see. Walter was 'talked' into the trip, and would become the navigator for almost all the 8000 miles, and this was just as he was turning seventeen years old.

His Uncle Merritt Elliott, and wife Ruth (sister to Stanley) were just 'retiring', having just stopped the boarding house and having the farm transfer to the next generation. So off took the brave band of five, usually with three on the front bench seat, and two in the back.

An interesting, and valuable, piece of information was the map. Eleanor had sent to Conoco her itinerary, and they sent her, free, a bound booklet with sectional maps of her driving route, probably about twenty-five map pieces, with the suggested route marked in orange. It reminded us of AAA, but on a much more personal scale.

So, the first page was the map. The next two pages, with pictures and compact text, were sites of interest. The fourth page was a listing of places to stay along the way. Then came the next map sectional. This book is a classic! The first day took them to Walter's sister Edna's home in Oil City, PA (Tim Adams, present for this meeting, would be born just as the trip was finishing) and, by Day 3, the quintet was already in Iowa.

Walter also kept (or had passed down to) a photo album, a mix of washed out color photos and still-sharp black and whites. (I suspect they still evoke the feeling the first time he saw that view.)

And during all this, both Walter and his mother kept a journal, noting something about each day (and also how many miles were covered).

Don selected a half-dozen dates, with Don reading Walter's, and Stephanie reading Eleanor's. The first three days were read, with all of us agreeing that both people were on the same trip, although Eleanor soon gets into writing about twice the length as Walter's, which is understandable, considering it's her trip, and Walter is busy driving.

However, two dates were selected where the focus of the entries were quite different. For one of them, Walter focused on the saw mill operation, while Eleanor focused on the more 'interesting' things. The second entry had Walter focusing on the fair, while Eleanor's memories were elsewhere.

Two separate entries of Walter's were read, noting the awe he felt about the redwoods and about having to get his mother up early. A piece of Eleanor's was read, with her awe of the countryside and her ignoring the obvious danger of walking close to cliff edges.

Walter's last entry: HOME! Some of the memorable pieces, either of Walter's, or of his re-telling this evening:

- Yellowstone
- redwoods, and driving the car through one
- Lake Louise beautiful but dirty from runoff
- · eating out for almost every meal
- · seeing movies most nights
- Will Rogers' monument on Pikes Peak
- · Eleanor's breathing difficulty at heights
- the heat on the way back (sticking newspapers between each other in the car to keep the other person's sweat off!)
- sense of country
- Walter's great pleasure in re-telling the story

Sixty-four years have passed since the trip transpired, but the details were still fresh, thanks to Walter's story-telling skills.

And as I am wont to didact, one of the great themes of literature, movies, life, etc., is that of the voyage – a trip that leads on to knowledge of others and self, that winds into the unknown to connect to what one has experienced, to test one's mettle and self-confidence (I could go on for a while but I won't). I had the distinct sense that this is one trip that grew in significance as time went on.

The next meeting is a share session, September 12th.

A special thank you goes to Stephanie for providing the cookie-brownie-cake concoction and for the juice. Much appreciated, Stephanie.




- a copy of a map from Walter's Conoco book: of Flagstaff, AZ in the bottom right.
